More from the meeting...

At the Community Meeting plenty of questions were asked. The invited guests were: Liz Herbert, Neighbourhood Watch Manager, Reading Police Station; Jon Westall, New Hope Centre; June Orton, Abbey Ward Councillor and Chris Bloomfield, Project Manager, Reading Borough Council.

Here is a selection of questions and replies from the panel:

What happened to the play area at Rivermead?

The play area was damaged after travellers set up camp at Rivermead. They were served an injunction to remove them from the site, but it would cost too much to replace the play area. The nearest play area is Beresford Road.

What events are planned for children?

An after school club takes place on a Thursday at New Hope. A kids club was organised for May half term and this will be repeated, but nothing was planned for the summer holidays. There is nothing set up for people of 16 years and over. A community worker has been talking to this age group to see what they are interested in. Jon is open to any ideas.

Does Neighbourhood Watch work?

Yes, Neighbourhood Watch does work. All crimes should be reported to the police, however minor they might seem, as the police's Community Action Team uses this information to target hot spots.

What can be done to make the area more green?

Try putting hanging baskets outside houses and general tidying up. Perhaps we could think about Reading in Bloom?

When can we have recycling for glass?

Glass will not be taken at the moment as it costs too much money to process for recycling. The next roll out of recycling will be green waste, as this takes up more of everyone's rubbish.

How often are our streets cleaned?

Channels are swept weekly on Fridays, footpaths on Tuesdays.


